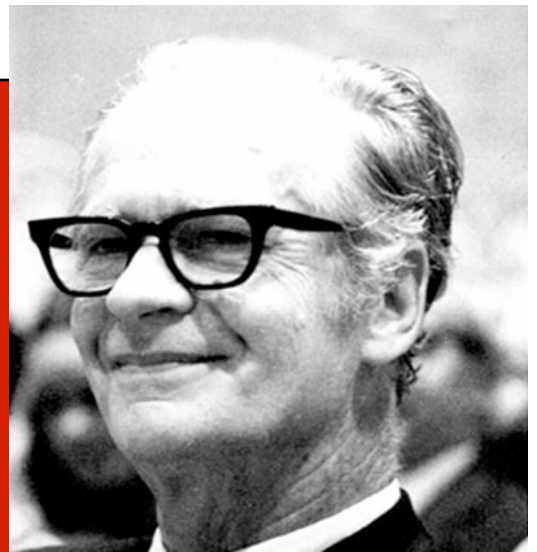

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The B.F. Skinner Foundation Scholarship for Graduate Student Re- search in Florida

In 2006, the B.F. Skinner Foundation established a scholarship for graduate student research in Florida. The first scholarship winner was Jeanne Donaldson, a student at Florida Institute of Technology.

Under the direction of Dr.

Matt Normand, Ms. Donaldson began conducting a study on increasing physical activity with overweight and obese adults. The \$500 scholarship award allowed her to purchase five heart rate monitors that recorded calorie expenditure. These monitors allowed Ms. Donaldson to use calorie expenditure as a dependent measure for physical activity.

Ms. Donaldson has just completed her first year in the Applied Behavior Analysis Master's program at Florida Institute of Technology. Currently, she is working extensively on her the-

sis, the experiment made possible by the B.F. Skinner Foundation Scholarship.

This summer, Ms. Donaldson is hoping to begin working on additional projects using heart rate monitors, with a concentration on increasing physical activity in children. Also over the summer, Ms. Donaldson will begin her intensive practical training with the University of Florida's Behavior Analysis Services Program, which trains foster parents on a set of behavioral parenting tools.

The B.F. Skinner Foundation welcomes its newest Board Member - Dr. Allen Murphy



In January of 2007, Dr. Al Murphy officially joined the B.F. Skinner Foundation as a board member. Dr.

Murphy received his B.S. from Penn State, a master's from C. W.

Post College, and a Ph.D. from Florida State University. He served as a consultant at residential facilities for the mentally retarded for 10 years followed by 9 years as the consulting behavior analyst for exceptional students in a public school district.

Dr. Murphy's current position is as Associate in Psychology and Coordinator of Applied Placements at Florida State University - Panama City where his main duties are within the master's program in applied behavior analysis.

Dr. Murphy served as the Florida Association for Behavior Analysis' Conference (FABA) Program Chair from 1995-2005, as its President in 2002, and as Executive Director since 2006.

Since 1994, Dr. Murphy has been involved in marine turtle conservation. He is the co-founder of the South Walton Turtle Watch, recognized as the 2000 Volunteer Organization of the Year by the Florida Wildlife Foundation.

Suzanne Letso and the Connecticut Center for Child Development

The Connecticut Center for Child Development, Inc. (CCCD) is a private, nonprofit organization dedicated to improving the lives of individuals with autism, Asperger's Syndrome, and other pervasive developmental disorders throughout their lifespan. Instructional methods are based on applied behavior analytic learning principles.

Suzanne Letso is the co-founder and Chief Executive Officer of the CCCD and its subsidiary, The Institute for Educational Planning. In addition to her work at the CCCD, Ms. Letso also provides consultative services to assist in the development of new educational programs for individuals with disabilities. She is a board certified behavior analyst, holds a Master of Arts degree in leadership from Duquesne University, and is the parent of two children, one of whom is her 17 year-old son with autism.

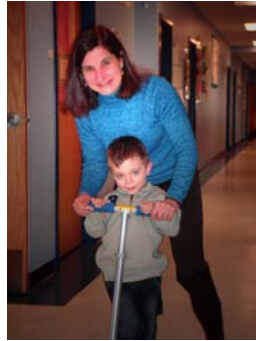

I recently had the chance to speak with Ms. Letso about her work at the CCCD. She and her husband, as well as another mother of a child with autism, founded the CCCD in 1995. Their dream was that one day, effective, science-based treatments for all people with autism would be readily available regardless of age, severity of condition, income, or place of residence. From the beginning, the organization's mission has been to improve the lives of individuals with autism by providing educational opportunities utilizing empirically validated teaching strategies, to advance the field of behavior analysis, and to promote effective autism treatments.

Letso described the beginnings of her organization: "CCCD began at my kitchen counter, with a card board box in my dining room as my filing cabinet, and a post office box as our official address. Today, we operate 8 programs based on behavior analytic learning principles including a private school

program for children 3 -21 years of age, a diagnostic center, and a professional training initiative; and are poised to open a 9th program which is a behaviorally based school program for children with high functioning autism and Asperger's Syndrome. We recently purchased 4.57 acres of land and are in the process of building a much larger facility that is slated to open in January 2008. This new building will not only enable us to enhance our current programs, but also to continue to expand our offering of services."

Currently, the CCCD provides services to over 60 children and their families and maintains a ratio of 1.5 teachers to every student. The Center's long-term goal for students, including Letso's son Tyler, is an adult life in the least restrictive environment possible. The CCCD has been collaborating with a local agency that designs and runs "customized" residential settings for adults with autism. "They have the experience and manpower to operate residential placements, and we bring our

expertise in ABA, autism, education, and staff training to the relationship. We hope to have our first home for five young men with autism operating by September, and a second, designed specifically for two of our students who are twins, is underway," said Letso.

The CCCD also offers life-long transition and follow-up educational and consultative services for the students who are able to "graduate" and lead relatively independent lives. Each student is different, however, and it is important not to measure success solely by the student's ability to achieve independence. Letso explained, "Some of our 'best outcome' students have lost their diagnosis and returned to a regular education setting with little or no support. However, these kids represent only a small percentage of the children we serve. At CCCD we actually do not define success by that gold standard of complete remediation of autistic symptoms, although it does happen for a segment of our students. Many of our children are significantly challenged by their autism, and like my son, when they get older receive a dual diagnosis of both autism and mental retardation. Every new skill these children learn is hard won. It would be a disservice to these kids, their teachers, and their parents to only measure their success with the yardstick of recovery."
